Bethlehem Soldier Dies in France
After Winning Medal for
Capturing Huns

BETHLEHEM, Pa., June 8.—Private Bernard H. Bolt, Bethlehem's second son to sacrifice his life for his country in France, died in a base hospital on May 29 from wounds received in action.

He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl G. Bolt, was born in Belwitz, Prussia, and came with his parents to America when 6 years of age.

He enlisted in the United States regular army when not quite 18 years of age and saw service on the Mexican border with Company K, Third regiment infantry, to which he was attached, being sent to France last June.

He helped to capture four Germans last March for which he received a special medal. The father has just been notified officially by the adjutant general, at Washington, D. C., of his son's death
