

MR. J. C. KILLOUGH KILLED IN ACTION

Another Hero of Autauga Pays the
Supreme Sacrifice and Sleeps
In France.

ANOTHER HOME SADDENED

Mr. G. W. Killough, of Prattville beat, received a telegram from the war department last week announcing the death of his son, J. C. Killough, on November 22nd from wounds received in action.

Joseph Cook Killough was the son of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Killough of Prattville beat. He was born twenty years ago last April. He went to France with the Rainbow Division and was a member of Company A, 167th Division. He entered the army July 1st, 1917. He was in the hottest of the battles last summer and fall. He was wounded last summer and was commended by his officer for bravery in action. He recovered from his first wound and went in action again. His father received a letter from him from a hospital in France dated November 18th stating that he had been again mixed with a shrapnel, but did not fare so well the 2nd time. He evidently did not wish to worry his relatives at home. The telegram announcing his death came as a great shock.

Joseph C. Killough was one of Alabama's bravest lads and he gave his life for a great cause. He never complained of the great hardships, never hesitated in the heat of the great battles, but served his country heroically and unselfishly. Such heroes will live in the hearts of an appreciative people.
