- Anderson, David G., and Kenneth Sassaman. The Paleoindian and Early Archaic Southeast. Tuscaloosa: University of Alabama Press, 1996. State-by-state summaries of the earliest prehistoric cultures.
- Anderson, David G., and Robert C. Mainfort. The Woodland Southeast. Tuscaloosa: University of Alabama Press, 2001. A regional treatment of the Woodland Period, 1200 BC – AD 1000.
- Bense, Judith. Archaeology of the Southeastern United States: Paleoindian to World War II. Orlando: Academic Press, 1994. Summary of southeastern archaeology with references to Alabama.
- Blitz, John H. Moundville. Tuscaloosa: University of Alabama Press, 2008. An illustrated, popular guide to Moundville, the largest archaeological site in Alabama.
- Brown, Ian. Bottle Creek: A Pensacola Site in South Alabama. Tuscaloosa: University of Alabama Press, 2003. A comprehensive study of the most important Mississippian Period site on the northern Gulf Coast.
- Cambron, James W., and David Hulse. Handbook of Alabama Archaeology: Part I, Point Types. Huntsville: Archaeological Research Association of Alabama, 1964. An illustrated catalog of stone projectile points; one of the most popular books on Alabama archaeology.
- Funderburk, Emma Lila, Mary Douglass Foreman, and Vernon James Knight Jr. Sun Circles and Human Hands: The Southeastern Indians Art and Industries. 3<sup>rd</sup> ed. Tuscaloosa: University of Alabama Press, 2001. An illustrated catalog of southeastern artifacts; one of the most popular books on southeastern prehistory.
- Hudson, Charles. The Southeastern Indians. 1<sup>st</sup> ed. Knoxville: University of Tennessee Press, 1976. A commonly used resource that uses primary sources and historic observations to describe the history and culture of the southeastern Indians.
- Jenkins, Ned J., and Richard A. Krause. The Tombigbee Watershed in Southeastern Prehistory. Tuscaloosa: University of Alabama Press, 2002. An excellent study of regional cultures along the central Tombigbee River between 1000 BC and AD 1450.
- Knight, Vernon J. The Search for Mabila: The Decisive Battle Between Hernando de Soto and Chief Tascalusa. Tuscaloosa: University of Alabama Press, 2009. The latest study of the de Soto expedition of 1540 which had disastrous effects on the prehistoric cultures of Alabama.
- Knight, Vernon J., and Vincas P. Steponaitas. Archaeology of the Moundville Chiefdom. Tuscaloosa: University of Alabama Press, 2006. Scholarly but accessible series of articles on the very important site of Moundville.

Read , William A., James B. McMillan, ed. Indian Place Names in Alabama. Tuscaloosa: University of Alabama Press, 1984. Mostly about the historic period, this is a fascinating study of the origin of Indian place names.

Walthall, John A. Prehistoric Indians of the Southeast: Archaeology of Alabama and the Middle South. Tuscaloosa: University of Alabama Press, 1990. Although dated, this is still the best overall summary of Alabama prehistory.

Wimberly, Christine A. Exploring Prehistoric Alabama Through Archaeology. Birmingham: Explorer Books, 1980. This illustrated guide captures the attention of children. However, the easily understood concepts also appeal to the older student.
