Alabama. He's also worked on many other states and hasn't stopped with the completion of the Alabama index.

Allen Edwards is working on the eleven cubic ft. of Foreign Trade Relations Commission Administrative files, 1977-2001.

Chuck Maney and **Glen Alderton** are entering one hundred and sev-

enty cubic ft. of the various Codes of Alabama into a database.

Hardy Kirk is processing the eighty cubic ft. of Alabama Development Office Economic Development files, 1912-1971.

John Rylee, is refoldering the two hundred and forty-five cubic ft. of Dept. of Public Health, Admin. files of the State Health Officer, 1866-ongoing.

Martha Durham is processing the ninety-four cubic ft. of Alabama Dept. of Archives and History Admin. Files and the files of directors Thomas and Marie Owen, ca. 1901-1955.

Sandy Parsons is refoldering forty one cubic ft. of Governor's legal advisor's files,

1995-2011.

Willa Fay Munson is refoldering the twenty-four cubic ft. of Alabama Building Commission Project files, 1945-1986.

Paul Robertson and **Ed Ewing** are working on identifying and sleeving over one hundred cubic ft. of George C. and Lurleen B. Wallace files and their family photographs.

Gene Stabler is refoldering Governor George C. and Lurleen B. Wallace administrative files from the 1960s.

FRIENDS OF THE ALABAMA ARCHIVES AND YOU

The Friends of the Alabama Archives is a nonprofit, membership auxiliary to the Department of Archives and History. Founded in 1982, its purpose is to provide support for Archives programs and to promote awareness of the Archives among the general public.

The first project undertaken by the Friends was the refurbishment of a space to be used for public programs and meetings. The effort

memorialized former director Milo B. Howard Jr., and the auditorium named for Howard has been the venue for thousands of events since.

The scope of projects and programs underwritten by the Friends quickly grew. The organization purchased equipment for the research room and museum on a number of occasions and sponsored numerous public symposia. Ongoing programs include the monthly ArchiTreats series, fellowships for young scholars, the gift shop, the administration

of numerous grants, and even the purchase of coffee and snacks for our volunteers.

In addition to supporting the Archives, other benefits include a quarterly newsletter and 10% discount in the Gift Shop. (Friends who join at \$100 level or higher also receive a subscription to Alabama Heritage magazine.)

INSIDE THE ARCHIVES

4th Alabama Infantry (Co. E, Conecuh Guards) Flag

This flag was presented to the Conecuh Guards at the Sparta Depot in Conecuh County on April 24, 1861. It was one of ten company flags used during a dress pa-



rade at Harpers Ferry, Virginia in June 1861 and was reported to be illustrated in an issue of Harper's Weekly.

When the 4th Alabama was brigaded under General Bernard Bee all of the company flags were turned in except for that of the Marion Light Infantry. James W. Darby (last captain of the company) was custodian of the flag. Somehow the flag was

secured and brought back to Alabama by Private Henry C. Stearns of the Conecuh Guards.

The flag was presented to the Alabama Department of Archives and History on November 22, 1907 by Colonel P. D. Bowles and Captain James W. Darby, both formerly of the 4th Alabama Infantry.

This flag hasn't been conserved yet.
